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

EU Policies: Current situation (1)

- European Green Deal sustainability legislation adopted on emission trading, reporting, design, transparency, due diligence, deforestation, trade
- Strong resistance from political surge to the far right and conventional businesses
- EU not on track to meet the Green Deal, Paris and Sustainable Development Goals
- More is needed


- Clean industrial Deal within 100 days

- Draghi report : need to invest €750 800 bn a year
- Implementing acts, infringement letters from European Commission



What is urgently needed to mainstream sustainable business models in SMEs? (1)

Ecopreneur.eu Input for new Commission:

- Support for the Draghi report
- Integrate the circular economy for all sectors
- Ambitious implementation of the European Green Deal
- Level playing field: Green Public Procurement + Economic incentives based on True Pricing (end fossil fuels subsidies, Extended Producer Responsibility, VAT, Tax Shift, Carbon Pricing)
- Regional Circularity Hubs for SME capacity building, including free vouchers

What is urgently needed to mainstream sustainable business models in SMEs? (2)

ECESP Joint Declaration asks the EU for:

- 1. Maintaining ambitious commitments to a circular economy
- 2. Expressing commitment to contribute to meeting the current targets
- 3. A just transition
- 4. Analysing and overcoming unintended barriers in existing legislation
- 5. Rolling out an enabling framework for sustainable competitiveness, particularly for SMEs;
- 6. Devising ambitious targets for the circular economy and resource consumption;
- 7. Measures to boost green industries, including SMEs and social enterprises
- 8. Using circular economy indicators to measure progress
- 9. Investing in circular economy projects and solutions
- 10. Circular economy solutions to promote innovation and competitiveness in all EU countries.

Circular Economy Joint Declaration

World environmental challenges such as climate change and biodiversity loss pose considerable risks to health and well-being. Linear resource extraction and processing account for half of total greenhouse gas emissions and more than 90% of biodiversity loss and water stress.

Institutional and European stakeholders agree that transitioning to a circular economy could help solve these existential crises. It would reduce greenhouse gas emissions, help conserve and restore nature, and relieve pressure on natural resources while ensuring that the EU is competitive and no one is left behind.

With the coming change in the European political landscape, the members of the Coordination Group of the European Circular Economy Stakeholder Platform want to flag up this issue to incoming legislators and advocate keeping the Green Deal and the circular economy as a primary focus for the next Commission and European Parliament, keeping the just transition as a critical narrative, supporting circular economy projects with sufficient funding and keeping European ambitions for a swift transition from a linear economy high.
